## **Reading Tips**

- READ! READ! READ!
  - If your child sees you reading, it will encourage them to read.
- Find opportunities to read to your child.
  - Read signs while driving in the car, at stores and while you're on vcacation (play a game where you watch for certain signs: McDonalds, Target, or signs with certain words on them).
- Sign your child up for a library card and take frequent trips to the library.
  - Make sure your child has access to a wide variety of reading materials.
    - Ex.: books (fiction and non-fiction), road signs, comics, magazines, etc.
- Try to find books about things that interest your child and let them choose books with your guidance.
- Read more difficult books aloud to your child.
  - This will help them strengthen and develop their vocabulary, as well as hear what a fluent reader sounds like.
- Come up with a fun incentive if a reading goal is accomplished!
  - Ex: desert treat, family game night, pizza dinner, etc.
- Most important tip: ENJOY reading with your child this summer!
  - Remember that reading should be fun. If your child has some difficulty, be patient and supportive in assisting them. Reading is a developmental process, and it will take time for your child to learn how to read. As partners in education, we need to provide a positive environment that encourages children to challenge themselves.
- 5 finger rule
  - As your child reads, take note of how many words they get wrong on a single page. 1-2 words wrong, the book is too easy. 5-6 words wrong, the book is too hard. 3-4 words wrong, the book is just right!
